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WELCOME TO THE MAGIC VALLEY

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THIS MOST UNIQUE AREA of south-central Idaho is home to “The Magic Valley,” the cities of Twin Falls, Jerome, and Buhl, along with many surrounding communities. The magnificent Snake River cuts into hundreds of feet of volcanic rock and flows through the area playing an integral part to the economy and recreation of the area. This Magic Valley is at the heart of one of the world’s most productive farming regions. Nearly a hundred years ago pioneering farmers homesteaded and irrigated the fertile Snake River Plain, turning a sagebrush desert into productive agricultural land.

This high desert area of southern Idaho became an agricultural center with agriculture continuing as a cornerstone of the region’s economy. Twin Falls and Jerome have long been agricultural centers with several of the largest employers being involved in food processing. In the past decade Twin Falls has become a small urban center with a diversified economy of agriculture, manufacturing, light industry, service, wholesale, and retail. Specialty shops bring shoppers to the tree-lined historic downtown, while exterior boundaries of Twin Falls are brimming with numerous franchise stores and the Magic Valley Mall. Twin Falls is also the center of commerce, medical care, entertainment, and education for the people of southern Idaho and northern Nevada.

Entertainment is plentiful, offering fairs, rodeos, stock car racing, along with top-notch junior college and high school sports. Touring and local groups present a wide variety of fine and performing arts.

Recreational activities are endless; there are canyons, rivers, and mountains in southern Idaho offering year-round recreational opportunities. Golf and tennis facilities are available, one can fish for everything from trout to sturgeon, soak in hot springs, enjoy white water rafting, kayaking, water and snow skiing, scenic boat tours, hunting, and more.

With all this area has to offer, it is no wonder people are moving here. Some move to southern Idaho because they have been transferred by major corporations based in the region, others come to live a less hectic life-style, some like the weather, yet others enjoy the close proximity to the metropolitan areas of Salt Lake and Boise. Young families and retirees alike find southern Idaho an ideal place to call home.

CLIMATE & TOPOGRAPHY

Nevada lies to the south, and in the distant north the Sawtooth Mountains rim the horizon. This high desert plain of south-central Idaho that we know today was formed approximately 15,000 years ago by the great Bonneville flood which gouged out huge canyons, moved boulders, and left enormous sand bars. The resulting landscape consists of water, with hot and cold springs, volcanic lava flows, deep box canyons, fossil beds, and vast rock formations. The heart of this “Magic Valley” is the Snake River Canyon which gives the river’s water the potential for irrigation which has brought lush life to what was once an arid desert. South-central Idaho is a land of warm summers and mild winters, a land that has served the Indian, settler, miner, farmer, and rancher for hundreds of years.

TWIN FALLS PROFILE

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LOCATED IN SOUTHERN IDAHO, Twin Falls is midway between Boise to the east and Pocatello to the west. The city sits at an elevation of 3,729 feet, about seventy miles south of the world famous ski resort of Sun Valley. Twin Falls is the county seat of Twin Falls County, home to the College of Southern Idaho and is at the heart of one of the world's most productive farming regions. Along with agriculture Twin Falls is rapidly becoming known as a regional hub for South Central Idaho with a growing population. The moderate climate, good employment prospects, abundant natural resources, and the endless recreational opportunities have brought retirees and young families alike to the city. Whether you are a young family just getting started, a mid-career relocater, or retired and looking for relaxation and recreation, Twin Falls is certainly a great place to settle and a great place to raise a family.

EMPLOYMENT

The economy of the Magic Valley (includes Twin Falls, Jerome, Blaine, Camas, Cassia, Gooding, Lincoln, and Minidoka counties) appears to be the best performer proportionately in the entire state, especially in the area of new job creation. This performance is due to economic diversification and new residential and industrial construction.

Twin Falls county ranks sixth in population and thirteenth in land mass for Idaho. The federal government owns 52 percent of the acreage. Agriculture and food processing dominate the local economy, but trade, services, and government are major employers for the area.

HISTORY

The Shoshone people settled in southern Idaho thousands of years ago. More recently emigrants moved west on the Oregon Trail and settled the area. Twin Falls was a planned community by its founders in 1904.

The town was built to serve settlers arriving to take advantage of a new irrigation project, made possible by the Carey Act, which encouraged pioneers to file and settle on 160-acre tracts of land sold at \$25 per acre.

Funds derived from the sale of these lands, was used to construct a canal that carried irrigation water from the Snake River at Milner Dam. In 1905, I. B. Perrine a young, ambitious man envisioned the potential for the waters of the Snake River. In 1900 Perrine incorporated his company and named it the Twin Falls Land and Water Company then issued rights to the irrigation water. Productive farmland seemed to spring up out of nowhere on this sagebrush-covered Idaho desert and so did the town of Twin Falls.

John E. Hayes was hired in 1904 to do the layout and surveying of the town site of Twin Falls and subsequently the first plat was filed under the name of Twin Falls. E. L. Masqueray the professional planner who designed the 1904 World's Fair grounds in St. Louis, was hired to design Twin Falls, township. It was his idea to locate a park at the center of town. Churches and schools were built on donated lands, and thousands of trees were planted. In 1907 Twin Falls was named the county seat of the newly created County of Twin Falls. A bridge spanning the Snake River was completed in 1926. Today's Perrine Bridge is a replacement for that original bridge. The airport opened in 1948, followed by the first town shopping center, the Lynwood, in 1957. The College of Southern Idaho (CSI) began night classes in 1965, using high school facilities, moving to its own campus three years later.

CHOBANI

In 2012 Chobani, the international yogurt company, opened its second U.S. plant in Twin Falls with an initial investment of \$750 million. The company was attracted to the Magic Valley in part because of the extensive dairy farming industry in the area. The plant, which would become the largest yogurt production facility in the world, would hire some 7,000 workers, reducing the unemployment rate in the region from 6.3 percent to 2.4 percent.

In 2013 the building won the DBIA Design-Build Project of the Year Award and the 2013 Food Plant of the Year award from *Food Engineering* magazine. In 2017 the company began building a \$20 million, 70,000 square-foot expansion of the facility, which now includes a global research and development center.

JEROME PROFILE

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AT AN ELEVATION of 3,765 feet and located at the intersection of Interstate 84 and State Highway 79, Jerome is central to southern Idaho. This friendly city is the county seat and serves as the civic and economic center of Jerome County. Agriculture dominates the economy but the city is broadening its base in the retail, manufacturing, and service industries. Jerome has numerous, well maintained parks, several golf courses in the area, a 40-bed hospital, library, fairgrounds, museum, movie theater, and several specialty shops in its downtown.

Jerome was established in 1907 when W. S. and J. S. Kuhn of the Twin Falls North Side Land and Water Company toured the area to select future sites for company towns. They selected a site in the middle of the sagebrush for one of their irrigation projects and named it Jerome, in honor of W. S. Kuhn's son. This site was the designated center of town; before you knew it you saw tents and buildings being constructed.

The Kuhns created a subsidiary company, the Twin Falls North Side Investment Company. This company was developed to assist with the development of downtown Jerome and to sell town lots. The Kuhns kept their promise by providing a deep well, electrical service, and water system before the town was completed. The town lots were sold from atop of I. B. Perrine's stagecoach. The following day drawings for farmland took place. Due to inclement weather a huge tent had to be erected before this great event could take place. A majority of the prospective settlers were from the Midwest, even though the entire country was represented.

Jerome boomed in 1909, at the same time the irrigation canal was delivering its first water. Lots were given to churches who wished to construct houses of worship. There were several blocks of land dedicated for city parks. Once the town was completed the company built its big hotel, the grand North Side Inn.

On its fifth anniversary, most of upper and lower downtown was



completed. The intervening two blocks were under construction or almost completed. A good indication this community was going to survive was its three banks. Two were owned by local businessmen and one by the Kuhns.



STATE PARKS

City of Rocks

Fifty-five miles south of Burley is a National Reserve nestled amidst the mountain peaks of the Albion Mountain Range with recreational activities include hiking, wildlife viewing, picnicking, rock climbing, backpacking, Nordic skiing, photography, and horseback riding.

Castle Rock

Off Idaho 77, Castle Rock is Idaho's newest State Park. It features giant granite spires, collectively known as "Castle Rocks." This 1,240 acre park includes the former Castle Rock Ranch, spires, and archeological sites of different cultures dating back 2,470 years. Recreational activities include rock climbing, picnicking, hiking, equestrian trails, wildlife viewing, and bird watching.

Niagara Springs

Take I-84 Exit 157 near Wendel. Niagara Springs is part of the Thousand Springs complex. The springs tumble down a canyon side at 250 cubic feet per second. Recreational activities include year-round fishing, wildlife and waterfowl viewing, and picnicking.

Malad Gorge

Take I-84 Hagerman exit. Malad Gorge is a 642-acre park displaying spectacular canyon views with the Malad River cascading through the canyon to the Snake River. Recreational activities include hiking, fishing, picnicking, and wildlife viewing.

SHOSHONE FALLS & DIERKES LAKE PARK

Appropriately called the "Niagara of the West," the falls are 212' high—52' higher than Niagara. Located three miles east of Twin Falls, this falls is prime during spring runoff and wet years; it is a spectacular sight even during years of low water levels. The park is open 7am to 9pm. At Dierkes Lake, adjacent to the park there are places to picnic, swim, and fish.







BALANCED ROCK

Located east of Castleford this is a geological rock creation that defies gravity—a wind eroded boulder balanced on a narrow neck. This world famous rock is mushroom shaped with the base measuring 3'x 17" and the top 48' in diameter. This phenomenon of nature stands 200' tall; it is possible to hike up to the rock. The road to this rock is through a beautiful canyon area of perpendicular rock formations with numerous caves. Hiking trails are in the canyon along with picnic areas.
